A PRAYER OF PRAISE, CONFESSION AND THANKSGIVING

Father, we praise you that whoever we are, and wherever we go, you are there. We cannot hide and we cannot run. You are always ahead of us preparing the way. Lord, you are ever near, ever approachable. In the midst of our anxiety and fear you are always understanding; coming into our turmoil; our doubts; our weakness and despair; and you come with peace. And Father, we praise you for the joy of knowing that whatever we have done, or failed to do, we can experience the joy of forgiveness and the joy of beginning again. BIBLE READING Luke 17: 11-19 (NRSV)

¹¹ On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. ¹² As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, ¹³ they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" ¹⁴ When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. ¹⁵ Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. ¹⁶ He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. ¹⁷ Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? ¹⁸ Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" ¹⁹ Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

REFLECTION

I thought this morning that I would share one of my favourite Bible stories with you. It is a lovely little story which begins with Jesus walking along the border between Galilee and Samaria where one could expect to encounter bandits and those excluded from their community because they were carrying some kind of disease.

It was a group such as this, ten men with leprosy, who approached Jesus but it is not clear that they were actually looking for healing. They were outcasts, shunned by nearly everyone and they stood alone (an early example of social distancing!). Standing some way off they had to raise their voices so that Jesus could hear them. They shouted "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" so it may be they just wanted Jesus to be aware of their problem. We are not told that Jesus shouted back so it seems he may well have walked towards them. His words "Go and show yourselves to the priests." must have given them confidence that that they were to be healed and would soon be returning home.

At first, this seems a strange thing for Jesus to say but it was the procedure to be followed after a healing. Under Old Testament Law it was only the priest who could certify that the person was clean and fit and be allowed once again to re-enter society. Leviticus chapter 14 says: "The Lord gave Moses the following regulations about the ritual purification of a person cured of a dreaded skin disease. On the day he is to be pronounced clean, he shall be brought to the priest and the priest shall take him outside the camp and examine him. If the disease is healed, the priest shall" Then the next twenty-odd verses go on to list things which need to be done before purification is complete.

The lepers set off to the priests and as they made their way they were made clean. This was a very important moment for each of them of course but apparently they were so excited that they forgot to go back and express their thanks. In a perfect world we could expect all ten men to run back to Jesus and thank him for the new start in life he had given them but Luke doesn't tell us what happened to nine of them. However, before we

judge them too harshly, I wonder how each of us would have behaved?" How many times do we take <u>our</u> blessings for granted and fail to thank the Lord?

However, the tenth man was not so ungrateful. Seeing what had happened to him, he was filled with praise for God and was deeply moved by the love Jesus had shown towards him. Not only had he been outwardly healed, it had also changed his heart and he wanted people to know what God had done for him. Jesus was clearly touched by the Samaritan's reaction to being healed. We can sense Jesus' disappointment at seeing only one man when he asked: "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" Note that Jesus wasn't asking for personal thanks; he was hoping that all these men would at least understand that they had been made whole through God's love. Yet it was only one, a despised Samaritan, who bothered to come back to offer thanks. He is a lesson to all of us who too often take God's love for granted.

There must be many people living within the geographical area covered by D&SW Circuit who feel they don't belong to their community or feel isolated for one reason or another. As Christians we are called upon to embrace all those who feel they are outsiders and give them the confidence and encouragement needed to be accepted and become active members of the community. Like the Samaritan, such people are often looking for understanding and acceptance. Christ's love is available for everyone and in the same way we should make our love available to those who feel they don't belong. It is worth bearing in mind that they may be more worthy of receiving <u>our</u> love than we are of receiving the love of God.

So here we have another fascinating Bible story. Yes, to start with it is a story of healing but as we have seen, there is a lot more to it than that. There is the example Jesus has given us in accepting and loving those who are excluded and we must also look at the gratitude shown by that one Samaritan. Happily, we can always express our gratitude to a God who, in love, continually accepts us and blesses us in so many ways. Amen

We pray for all the churches in our circuit where clergy and lay people are working in strange and difficult circumstances to find new ways of serving you. We thank you for our fellowship and pray that the Holy Spirit may lead us into deeper ways of sharing and witnessing together.

And finally we pray for ourselves. In a few moments of silence we bring to God all those things that are troubling us this morning and the decisions we know we have to face in the coming days. May the light of Christ find its way into even the darkest corners of our lives.

We bring all our prayers in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen
