

Opening the Church for Private Prayer

Government guidelines now allow us to open the church for private prayer. A small group has considered the implications, bearing in mind the need for social distancing and good hygiene during the present covid-19 epidemic. We have decided to open the church on Sundays from 11.30am to 12.30pm, so that it does not overlap with the Zoom service, and between the same times on Wednesdays. We hope to start on Sunday, 5th July.

Visitors wishing to pray will enter through the main doors from South Street. The doors from Charles Street will remain locked, and those with keys should not try to enter that way. There will be a steward at the door in case there is a queue. In the foyer, a second steward will insist that visitors use the hand gel which we will provide, and offer them a face covering if they do not have their own. In the church, there will be only about fourteen, well-spaced chairs, and a third steward will monitor the church and the exit. When visitors wish to leave, they will exit via the door at the front to the right of the organ, and turn sharp right to go down the alleyway back to South Street.

All doors will be propped open, so there will be no need for visitors to touch the door handles. All bibles, hymn books and toys etc will be removed. Visitors may, of course, bring their own. The toilets will not be available.

The stewards have been consulted, and we have now decided to go ahead. We need volunteers who feel able under the current Government guidelines to act as stewards. No-one should feel under any pressure to take part, but, if we had, say, twelve volunteers, then it would work out at one duty every fortnight. If you are willing to help, please let John and Wendy Hilton know.

'For you shall go out in joy, and be led back in peace; the mountains and the hills before you shall burst into song, and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands. (Isaiah 55:12)

I choose this text with my tongue firmly but sadly in my cheek for as I write lockdown is gradually being reduced and although there is a certain degree of joy and metaphorical hand-clapping, I think there is also quite a considerable amount of continuing anxiety and concern that the sacrifices that had been made over the last months could be undone by overzealous "going out in joy".

People have been able to shop for 'non-essential' items though in truth I'd never thought of clothes and shoes as such? Then again, perhaps it just shows what a privileged life I have led that I take such things for granted?

And in the light of all the chaos and demonstrations resulting from yet another racist event in the USA, which has resulted in sympathy events on this side of the pond, reminding us that folk here in the UK are still not treated justly and equally, I am aware that in my whole life of 60+ years I have never been abused, ridiculed or treated detrimentally simply because of the colour of my skin.

I can't help feeling that seeing an officer of the law callously squeezing the life out of George Floyd, whilst his colleagues made no suggestions that he was being overly brutal, has perhaps brought it home to many of us how jolly privileged are those of us who are 'white British'?

Actually the privilege of living in the UK was underlined this week when I received a video to be used at United Church Dorchester from our chosen major charity this year, the Mission Aviation Fellowship, which starts recounting how so many of us are feeling challenged by isolation during lockdown, but it then goes onto an aerial image of an African village. There it almost doesn't have to say the next line that, for many in other parts of the world, that is an everyday experience and has been for years.

Again it made me reflect upon the restrictions that I might have grumbled about and the strange relief at the recent gradual reductions that have been happening. I hope and pray that I shall be more realistic in my appreciation and gratitude once this strange period is over? And talking of this strange period, this week I received a new hymn written by John Bell of the Iona Community. The tune isn't spectacular but the words I think are very powerful:

We will meet when the danger is over,
we will meet when the sad days are done;
we will meet, sitting closely together
and be glad our tomorrow has come.

So let's make with each other a promise,
that when all we've come through is behind,
We will share what we missed and find meaning
In the things that once troubled our mind.

We will join to give thanks and sing gladly,
we will join to break bread and share wine;
and the peace that we pass to each other
will be more than a casual sign.

Until then may we always discover
Faith and love to determine our way.
That's our hope and God's will and our calling
For our lives and for every new day.

Coffee and chat

As part of our continuing efforts to help everyone feel that they are still part of a larger community, we have been investigating how best to create 'virtual' or online meetings for groups of church members. Many of us will be used to using things like Skype or Facetime for one-to-one video calls, and we have now found a way of doing something similar but with larger groups.



So some of us have been meeting in virtual or online 'coffee and chat' sessions – three times a week, at 11.00 on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Currently, around 20 of us have signed up to join the chats on various days, with somewhere between 10 and 15 people at each session. Even though the Government has just decided to continue the voucher scheme during the school holidays, the charity has decided to continue to provide food for families in need through the summer. A £15 Government voucher for food for the week is not a lot to feed a growing child.
