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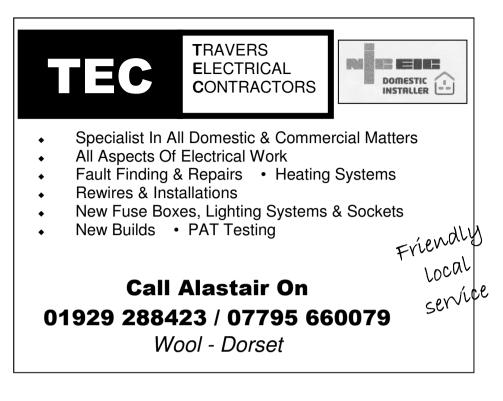
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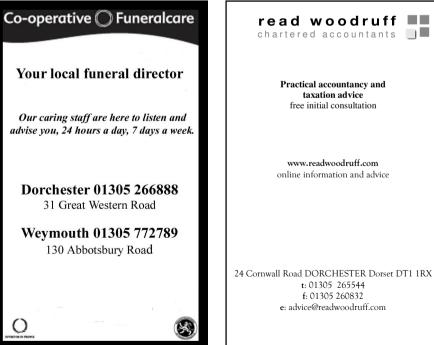




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From the Manse

Dear Friends,

As I write the church calendar moves into what is rather dully known as 'Ordinary Time" i.e. one of the periods of the year without a specific major (or minor) festival. Ordinary Time is a period when, unconstrained by the necessity to focus on Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Pentecost or whatever, (not that we would ever want to ignore them!) we are actually given the opportunity to explore our Bible texts more freely. Not that we always do so, but the option is there during 'Ordinary Time' to make it into 'Extraordinary Time!'

And of course, there are many other ways of exploring our wonderful Scriptures, which, read untutored may often seem confusing and opaque. Many of us purchase Daily Readings Guides, programmes to read the 'Bible in a Year' or use a resource like Tom Wright's 'For Everyone' series, which breaks each of the books of the New Testament into bite-sized chunks, which even have the text itself first in his own translation. I myself have found this latter resource very helpful, with each day being led though a mini sermon on the text and over time have read though every one of the series. Some more than once. Indeed John Goldingay has been commissioned to do the same offering for the books of the Hebrew Scriptures, though I have to confess that personally, they weren't quite as impressive. Nevertheless they did make the Old Testament very accessible, so not altogether bad!

Recently in the United Church we have been exploring other ways of refreshing the existing Home / Fellowship / Bible Study groups that already meet and see if they can be even more helpful than they already are? So that is yet another way in which we have the opportunity to explore, study, and develop our faith. All of these I thoroughly encourage folk to consider if they are not doing so already, because frankly I do not think one hour on a Sunday morning is really enough.

But to all these choices, may I offer yet another one? This one is only any good if you have email and regularly check your emails. And particularly convenient if you pick up your emails on a tablet. It is called Daily Devotions from the URC and is an initiative that I signed up for nine months or so ago and have thoroughly enjoyed since doing so.

Essentially it is a daily email which arrives at 6:00am each morning and consist of a reading, a short reflection and a prayer. Mostly the reading is in a series from a book of the Bible or a series of Psalms and sometimes there are weeks when a series of classic hymns are offered. It is really interesting (and quite innovative) to read a bit of background and an offering of a new way of looking at these wonderful poems we mostly sing without thinking about very much, as we focus rather more on keeping to the tune! There are currently over 150 contributors, so even if occasionally the reflection is not as fulfilling as usual, fear not, there will be a

different one in a different style tomorrow! And the lovely thing is that you can add these to your practice in addition to your current ones if you wish or, if you don't currently do such a thing, they are an easy way into such a way of developing your theological insight and spirituality.



If you are interested, the link can be found on <u>http://</u> <u>devotions.urc.org.uk/</u> where there is a great big blue box to click on if you wish to subscribe. If it doesn't ring your bells, then unsubscribing is equally easy. I recommend this as worth a go, even if unfortunately for you there will be my own first contribution in the first week of Advent ... when Ordinary / Extraordinary Time is but a memory!

Dorset County Show Sat 2nd & Sun 3rd Sept

It is that time of the year again when the best of Dorset is on show to the public as people come from many a mile to enjoy all that is the Dorset County show. For the fourth year running United Church will be there amongst all the other stalls



and attractions as we welcome parents and their children to marquee so that they can feed and change their off spring. We are again next to the WI refreshment marquee which is huge and attracts so many looking for refreshment (that includes those in our marquee who need to keep up their stamina).

Plans are still to be finalised as to what we shall be offering in the way of activities, but our theme will still be "**Love me, Change me, Feed me**". We shall be asking our Young people if they will come and help on the Friday evening to put up our marquee and we will need people on the Saturday and Sunday to be available to help run activities, interact with parents and their children and provide a welcoming and loving place to be.

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


The Story of the Dorchester Minister who became a 'Founder of Massachusetts'

Local member and retired URC minister, David Cuckson, has written a new book about the Reverend John White, Rector of Dorchester during the troubled days of the early 17th Century, just as his old rectory in Colliton Street is about to be restored and incorporated as part of the £15 million planned new developments at the Dorset County Museum.

Under John White's leadership, after the disastrous fire that swept through Dorchester in 1613, the town was transformed into a model caring community, with systems of social welfare including a new school for the poor and almshouses for the elderly (which still continue today in West Walks and of which the Nappers Mite building in South Street was one). He then sought to export this model across the Atlantic and became the driving force behind the Dorchester Company and the Massachusetts Bay Company, and he inspired many folk from Dorset and the surrounding area to emigrate and found a new Dorchester in Massachusetts, and later Windsor in Connecticut.

David Cuckson (seen here outside John White's Rectory) said, 'I believe that John White's legacy should be more widely known. The new




initiative by the Dorset County Museum to bring the old rectory into the main body of the museum provides a great opportunity to celebrate his achievements both for Dorset residents and for visitors to the town from elsewhere, especially those from the USA seeking to explore the roots of their nation.'

The book (entitled *Dorchester's New World: The Vision of John White, 'Founder of Massachusetts')* includes a foreword by Dr Peter Down, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Dorset Natural History and Archaeological Society, and has been published by YouCaxton.co.uk. Julian Fellowes has commended the book as 'a fascinating account of the achievements of John White... He is one of the true founding fathers of America and his story deserves to be commemorated on both sides of the Atlantic.'

First Steps & Junior Church here at United Church, Dorchester

We are a small bunch these days but that certainly doesn't stop us having lots of fun. We are very fortunate to have lovely facilities which include a fantastic playroom, which the children (of all ages) absolutely love. We meet every Sunday joining in with" Big Church" for the beginning of Worship before leaving to learn all about 'Gods love for us' in our own way.

So what do we do?

- We play games, we sing, we even play musical instruments!!!
- We love crafting & making things, we even love making a mess!!
- We look at Bible stories, sometimes acting out a particular story.
- We pray & love it when the children become confident enough to want to read the prayers themselves.

The third Sunday of the month we have our own "**First Steps to Worship**". On this Sunday we don't join in with "Big Church" but have our own complete Worship upstairs. We enjoy this special time together and always end it with some refreshments usually squash & biscuits.

I'm sure we have missed something as we constantly search for new & exciting ways to learn about & enjoy Gods love for us. The children would love it if they had more friends to join us, so if you know anyone who might love what we have to offer, then we promise a very warm & friendly welcome

Buggies and Brunch at Bere Heath Chapel (Part of Peter Jenner's work as Children and Families Worker)

We meet once a month on a Saturday morning between 10.30 am and 12 noon. The morning is for children and their parents, guardians, grandparents, whoever looks after them. Generally there is a structured theme which includes various crafts (includes a lot of paint!!) bible story, planting bulbs and seeds, celebrating birthdays with cake. Parents getting their hands dirty helping their children. We always have brunch about ten past eleven with sandwiches, healthy options such as cucumber, carrots, tomatoes, and pies, crisps and juice. We can have up to 15 children plus parents, who come from either Bere Heath or Bere Regis. An offshoot of this is, that I (Peter Jenner) go in with a team made up of Anglican, Congregational and Methodist into Bere Regis first school every two weeks for "Open the Book " (Bible Society) and take assemblies acting out biblical stories. Working with the young people, their parents and Stewards from Bere Heath and Bere Regis is an absolute delight.

Messy Church at Bridport United Church

(Part of Peter Jenner's work as CFW)



We meet on the third Thursday of each month (except August) from 3.30 – 5.30pm. Age range is from 1 month to 13 yrs and again they come with parents, grandparents, or whoever is looking after them. On average there are about 30 children plus parents and about 12-15 leaders. (all the leaders work so hard to prepare for Messy church and work very well together.) Messy church has been going now for five years and we celebrated its 5th birthday in April. The sessions are themed and we cover the stories of Jesus in the Bible. The children when they come have a name badge, if it's their birthday have a birthday badge, get a drink and then get on with at least four to five different activities, which always includes a food making table. At 4.30 pm we go into Church for a story, which we try and act out and can include things they have made in the activities followed by a couple of songs (generally with actions). At 5pm we go back into the

hall where everything has been set for tea and we all sit down, say the Grace and eat . It could be chicken casserole, cottage pie, sausage hotpot, fish fingers & mash or picnic food and we always have pudding, banana & custard, chocolate bake & sauce, jelly & ice-cream to name but a few. Birthdays are celebrated (children & adults) with singing and cake (of course!). Messy Church is fun, noisy, fast moving, interactive, educational and brings parents and their children into a warm, welcoming and loving environment.

EPIC at Broadmayne Methodist Church (Part of Peter Jenner's work as CFW)

We meet on a Friday evening (term time) from 4pm to 5.30pm. The age range is from 9 to 13yrs, which is school years 5 -8. The young people that attend go to school on coaches and return on them. We do various crafts, watch DVDS, play games, get messy, have outings and try and make it a time of chilling out, after a week at school, so that they can enjoy the weekend . They eat copious amounts of toast with thick coverings of chocolate spread. (you would think they were laying bricks !!) We also see the Friday club (First School) members, who meet at St Martins in Broadmayne, as they move into Epic when they are nine. They are collected from Broadmayne First School and taken to St Martins. Friday afternoon is a fun afternoon for all those who attend, the numbers are not high, but we are fulfilling a need in the village.

Antics. For Young people across the Circuit & Pastorate aged from 13rs to 23 Yrs.

Steph and I meet with this group on the first Friday of each month (except August) either at the manse or in parents homes. We run from 6.30pm to 8pm. Food plays an important part at the beginning of our time together, giving a chance for the young people to catch up with each other and find out what they have been doing, both about school and whatever else they wish to share. There is no set pattern, we take each month as it comes. We may have discussions, watch a DVD, talk about what's happening in the world and decide about things that they would like to do as a group. Some of them help with putting up our Marquee for the Dorset County Show first weekend in September and helping during the weekend. They also help with the Easter breakfast and the Church Family Christmas meal. We try to make it a chill out time where they are with people of their own age and where they can be free to share their views and concerns, because after all they are the next generation.

Steph and I, Janice and a Dad, are going along with three of the young people to Greenbelt at Broughton Hall, Kettering, Northamptonshire over the August bank Holiday Weekend. If you do not know about Greenbelt it is a place to learn, to experience and to be. As well as music, the festival hosts a selection of various talks, workshops, debates exploring contemporary issues, Faith, Social Justice, Politics and more. Well worth attending.

If you know any young people, please do let them know what we do across the Circuit & Pastorate. They are the people of the present, but also of the future and we always make them feel welcome and very much part of our Church family and must not be ignored.

Dorchester Child Contact Centre

Many of you will remember the setting up of the Child Contact



centre many years ago and the UCD's involvement with that.

The Dorchester Child Contact is now a charity in its own right. We are accredited by the National Association of Child Contact Centres (NACCC). They carry out re-accreditation visits every three years and we have just been notified and are preparing for this in January 2017.

NACCC's aim is promoting safe child contact for children with their non-resident parent or Grandparents within a national framework of child contact centres.

Dorchester Child Contact Centre sessions are run by volunteers on the 1st and 3rd Saturday of every month at UCD. It is somewhere children can enjoy the company of the parent they are separated from. The children are always the centre of our focus and volunteers create a warm and friendly atmosphere with plenty of toys and unlimited cups of tea and coffee. We remain a neutral non-judgemental service for both parents and try to support them to arrange on going contact for their children in the community.



Website Post




